# THE VANITY IS RESTORED BY BRENT ANDERSON



One of our Society's most prized artifacts is the *Vanity*, the prototype of the famous Chesapeake 20, which graces the waterfront of our Museum. From 1934 to 1938 she was the consistent winner of most of the competitive races in the 20-foot open class on the West River.

To beat the *Vanity* became a challenge for many. In 1938, Captain Dick Hartge of Galesville was hard at work carving half hulls of what was to become the boat that would finally defeat the *Vanity*, the famous Chesapeake 20. Captain Dick sold his first Chesapeake 20, the *Ranger* to John Harding in June, 1938. Harding covered a three-mile course in 40 minutes 55 seconds. The *Vanity* covered the course in 40 minutes 57 seconds, suffering her first defeat.

Recognizing the historic significance of this vessel, E. Steuart Chaney generously donated the *Vanity* to the Shady Side Rural Heritage Society about 15 years ago.

To add to her historic significance, an application has been prepared by historian Jane Cox to have the *Vanity* included in the Maryland Inventory of Historic Properties. This is being done in conjunction with the Chesapeake 20 Association.

Ever since our acquisition of this vessel, the person most responsible for her maintenance has been our next door neighbor, Brent Anderson (shown above). Brent built the cradle in which she rests, and he worked with the late Co-President George Daly in having the sails perforated so they could be raised to their full beauty when we held outdoor events.

Brent has had some very serious health problems in recent years, and the *Vanity* was showing signs of neglect. A few months ago our Board was able to provide the funding for a new cover for it and also for the stick-up boat at the back of the Museum building. Once the *Vanity* could be protected with its new cover, Brent started work on its restoration, a job which would have cost thousands of dollars had he not volunteered to do the work. He sanded all the interior wood and sprayed it with a preservative. He sanded the exterior, which is fiber-glassed but had some areas of wood damage underneath which he filled and covered. He arranged for a large piece of equipment to remove the mast so that he could sand and paint it.

The final job was painting the entire boat and installing new sheets for the sails. It looks just magnificent and is so important to reflect the era when recreational boating became a part of our maritime heritage. Brent has been one of our most dedicated, talented volunteers through the years. He is an exceptionally skilled craftsman in whose hands any tool is totally at home. His work is evident throughout the Museum building. Our thanks to him is endless for restoring the *Vanity* to her proud stature overlooking the West River and the Chesapeake Bay where she sailed in all her glory for some 80 years.

At a Board meeting September 15, there was a brief discussion about the need for some improvement on the landscaping at the rear of the Museum building. The two of them removed plants, saving those with special beauty, tilled, enriched and mulched the soil, and then added a stone border. Come spring, visitors will be welcomed by a lovely flower garden around the Museum sign, and a border of perennials along the rear of the building. Roberta and Richard completed this demanding task before the next Board meeting two weeks later, shopping for supplies, digging, hauling, lifting stones, and finding joy in the beauty they were creating.

The cost of the supplies was paid for by interest from the Daly Endowment Fund as it was intended for building and grounds purposes.

Your editor planned to acknowledge this landscape work in this newsletter, but was reminded of all the behind the scenes work Roberta has done for our Society, quietly, unassumingly. While thanking her for this landscape work, it seems appropriate to remind us of the many other things she has done, often without being asked, but just seeing a need and filling it:

- Served as Recording Secretary for three years, with superbly written minutes making sense out of sometimes confusing discussions.
- Served with distinction on our Board of Trustees offering sound advice on issues, based on good judgment and years of administrative service in government.
- Assumed responsibility for all facets of the food preparation and serving at our Winter Luncheon Series for the past several years, including menu planning, shopping, and cooking.
- Proposed and helped sell the striking new T shirts featuring the South County flag.
- Cleaned out the sheds, reorganized and cleaned the kitchen storage area, and similar tasks.
